he old adage, "learning the tools of the trade," is something we've taken to heart and are working hard to make a reality at Western Nebraska Community College.

To meet the demands of our community's growing trade workforce, we're making it easier than ever for students to get the vocational tools and training they need.

We've recently hired Russell Pontarolo in a new role as Trades/Training Coordinator. One of his responsibilities is to make credit and non-credit course connections, allowing for a smoother transition for students taking non-credit classes to easily crossover into academic credit-bearing programs.

Russell's non-credit training responsibilities include welding, health and safety, manufacturing, and

computer workshops. He'll also teach for-credit welding classes at night. Russell is currently receiving instruction, which allows him to be an authorized OSHA trainer, providing him the resources he needs to customize training to meet the needs of our region.

The spark of a great idea is powering another new, innovative program.

We've partnered with The International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers (IBEW Local 265) to assist with their Union Apprentice training for commercial electricians. They have a standing agreement with Southeast Community College in Milford, Nebraska and asked that we provide the same for their workers in our service area. Five of our students are now enrolled in IBEW Union-sponsored training and will receive technical credit that can transfer into our Associate of Occupational Studies degree. The IBEW program is a five-year apprenticeship program.

Getting more training programs rolling with mobile learning labs.

Our mobile learning labs provide organizations with flexible, onsite employee training facilitated by a designated WNCC technical trades instructor. Currently, WNCC offers occupational safety, medical, and computer classes at company locations throughout the panhandle with mobile simulators and equipment. By spring semester, we'll be adding welding training with our new mobile welding lab.

These exciting new additions to our traditional learning offerings are helping to forge a stronger workforce — one that will be well-equipped to handle the surge of new opportunities in the Nebraska panhandle.





Nursing a desire to study closer to home?

eginning this fall, Western Nebraska Community College will now enroll students in the advanced placement Associate Degree in Nursing (ADN) program on all three of its campuses. Previously, the program was only offered on the Scottsbluff campus. Now, practical nurses (PN) living in the Alliance and Sidney areas who want to further their education will have the option to take registered nursing classes closer to home.

PNs interested in the program should call and meet with a nursing advisor to develop an educational plan. The program requires additional prerequisites and a PN nursing license. Students interested in becoming a PN can also set up an appointment to meet with an advisor. Once students graduate from the PN program and successfully pass the National Council Licensure Examination, they may now return to complete their associate degree on the same campus.

At WNCC, we believe it's important to increase nursing educational opportunities for our rural areas. The U.S. Department of Labor-Bureau of Labor Statistics projects that employment for registered nurses will grow 19 percent from 2012-2022, and 25 percent for practical nurses over the same course of time. We know that the need for nurses in the panhandle is critical, and will continue to be a factor.

NURSING SHORTAGE

According to the Nebraska Center for Nursing, there is a projected nursing shortage of close to 3,900 registered nurses by 2020 and 1,800 practical nurses by 2020. One factor influencing the nursing shortage is the increasing number of nurses retiring. According to the Nebraska Center for Nursing, almost a quarter of nurses ages 62 to 65 and older leave the profession each year. Additionally, according to American Association College of Nursing, the increasing number of aging Baby Boomers and the need for healthcare contributes to the increasing demand for nurses. Therefore, expanding access to WNCC's Associate Degree in Nursing program to the Alliance and Sidney campuses is one way to serve the increasing nursing demand.



College are changing lives every day. For one student, scholarships meant not only financial assistance for schooling, but also a newfound confidence and motivation.

After leaving an unstable marriage five years ago, Michelle Talbot and her five daughters found themselves living in a one-bedroom apartment in a new town—Scottsbluff. Michelle had minimal resources, no high school diploma, and no way to provide for her daughters on her own.

An Internet search led her to WNCC where she took a brave first step by contacting staff. A week later, she began GED classes. Michelle didn't stop at earning a GED. Today, thanks to the support she received from WNCC faculty and staff including those pictured above, she's in her final semester at WNCC and sees her goal of completing her associate's degree in sight.



During the course of her studies, Michelle was the recipient of the Kellett Memorial Scholarship and the EducationQuest Reaching Your Potential Scholarship. She says she experienced more than just receiving money for her degree. "When I received my scholarships, I was thrilled to have the money to help me get through school — but more importantly, it was about people believing in me! Failure was an old friend of mine, but it was like people were saying, you can do this!"

"I've changed as a person," Michelle says, "and I know that I'm changing the direction for my children at the same time. I'm so grateful to WNCC for the options that led to choices, which led to a brighter future for my daughters and me."

Pioneer Hall Project Makes the Cut

ioneer Hall, the hub for most of the residential life activities in the Activity Center at Western Nebraska Community College, unveiled a major renovation and addition at a ribbon cutting celebration in July.

The three-story building received updated rooms, entryways and hallways, and saw an addition of 50 new rooms. It's now able to house 160 students in rooms that provide more personal space. The building also has improved climate control, updated plumbing and bathrooms, and an improved look for inside and outside the hall. Lounge areas were also renovated to capture spacious views of the Scotts Bluff National Monument.

Residential amenities include a music space, kitchen space, laundry room, and conference room.



"Our WNCC residence life staff work hard to develop a community and connections with each other and to provide opportunities for student engagement," said Sue Yowell, vice president of student services.

In total, 57,000 square feet were renovated, and the \$5 million project came in under budget by \$140,000.



WNCC Students Get a World-Class Education

A Harmonious Visit to Greece.

In July, our former Music Program Director Rita Stinner took 10 student members of the WNCC Choral group to Greece. There, they contributed to several performances during the 11th International Festival of the Aegean. This 12-day event creates a hot spot for tourists on the island of Syros during the summer.

Choir members participated in four performances of the Greek opera *Medea*. They took part in performances of Mozart's *Coronation Mass*, Beethoven's *Choral Fantasy*, and Faure's *Requiem*. Stinner and the students also participated in a solo sunset choir performance at the St. Nicholas Greek Orthodox Cathedral. Performances were sold out at the theater every night they were there.

Their trip started in Athens, but the group spent most of their time on Syros. Students were able to bond with the local people, eat traditional Greek food, visit various beaches, and observe critical historic events. "Just seeing how people live their lives and meet people who have the same common interests and goals was really cool," said Connor Zimmer, a student from Bridgeport. Both the people in Syros and the choir members cried when the visit was over.









Western Nebraska Community College provided opportunities to broaden students' horizons with two study abroad trips this summer—one to Greece and one to Guatemala. Our trips were partially funded by scholarships provided for the students through the WNCC Foundation.

I also traveled abroad with our students and Dean of Students Michael Houdyshell this year. In late May, we took 11 students to Central America. The goal? Introduce them to traveling abroad, provide an opportunity for language immersion, and develop their interests in culturally deeper subjects.

The trip was taken as part of our Global Studies class, which is held every two years. The class visited the capital city of Antigua in Guatemala, a UNESCO World Heritage site, to learn about the culture and study Spanish for four hours a day. Students said they were amazed at how fast they picked up the language, and how the native people were very friendly and open to foreigners.


