

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

Harvest a brighter future: New Applied Agriculture Certificate

In fall 2017, Western Nebraska Community College is offering a new one-year Applied Agriculture certificate—the first technical certificate we've offered in this field of study.

Because the agriculture industry is foundational to Nebraska's economic well-being, our advisory committee members told us interest was high in offering a program that takes just a year to complete and leads to a well-paying job. Opportunities in

agriculture are numerous, and include careers in sales, machinery, harvesting, and livestock.

We're also incorporating courses into the Scottsbluff High School Career Academy, and we hope other area high schools participate in our dual-credit offering.

Get your lab coats on: WNCC offers new AAS degree in **Medical Laboratory Technology**

WNCC is offering a new program that expands on our current industry phlebotomy training—an Associate of Applied Science degree in Medical Laboratory Technology.

The new program debuts in fall 2017, and includes both online courses and hands-on labs. The Medical Laboratory Technology degree was created after

reviewing data and studies showing that healthcare offers informed and skilled workers well-paying jobs that are in high demand in the panhandle area, especially within hospitals.

Filling the demand: New Pharmacy Technician program

WNCC is offering a new Pharmacy Technician training program in fall 2017 that trains students to successfully pass the Pharmacy Technician Certification Board (PTCB) exam, a certification that's required to work in the field.

The six- to eight-month program teaches the skills necessary to process, prepare, label, and maintain records of physicians' medication orders and prescriptions in a community pharmacy. Course focus includes customer service, count and pour techniques, prescription calculations, drug selection and preparation, over-the-counter

drugs, record keeping, stock level adjustment, and legal parameters.

The program fills the growing demand for entry-level pharmacy technicians, without the stringent requirements required for most other healthcare fields, and provides graduates with well-paying jobs.

Put your career in the fast lane: NEW ACCELERATED GENERAL BUSINESS TECHNOLOGY CERTIFICATE BY PAULA J. ABBOTT, MSM, SIDNEY CAMPUS DIRECTOR

n response to community needs for an accelerated certificate or degree program, Western Nebraska Community College is now offering an Accelerated General Business Technology certificate and degree.

Our new program builds upon business fundamentals with skills and knowledge that are designed to propel a participant's career forward. Students increase their workforce savvy with business-focused courses such as Information Technology, Principles of Management, Introduction to Entrepreneurship, and Business Law I.

The program is scheduled to begin fall 2017. Students may participate online, in the classroom, or a combination of both. The Accelerated General Business Technology certificate program can be completed in six months, and is tailored to meet the needs of any business or industry. It also can

be applied to earning an Accelerated General Business Technology Associate of Applied Science degree in as little as 14 months.



fter receiving 15 scholarships and numerous resources to help her overcome learning disabilities, Ashley Burr is successfully graduating from Western Nebraska Community College in May with her associate's degree in Elementary Education.

Remarkably, Ashley has paid her college tuition entirely with scholarships. She was awarded the Western Nebraska Teacher's Scholarship and received the Swanson Teacher's Scholarship for both years at WNCC. She also received the Early Enrollment Scholarship and Leadership Scholarship during her freshman year.

Ashley also drives a long way to attend school. Her commute to the Scottsbluff campus from her home in Chappell, Nebraska is 103 miles one way. At WNCC, she is a student ambassador at the Sidney campus, as well as Student Senate president and Phi Theta Kappa vice president.

She plans to transfer to Chadron State College to complete her bachelor's in Elementary Special Education.

If her track record isn't impressive enough, Ashley has done it all while working part-time and overcoming two learning disabilities dyslexia and dyscalculia (a math disability). WNCC granted Ashley special disability circumstances so she was able to record lectures and take her tests in a quiet environment.

Ashley credits Counseling Director Norm Stephenson for helping her find solutions to overcome her disabilities, and Student Services Coordinator Erin Huddleston for helping her map out her degree requirements to ensure transferability to Chadron State.

MICHAEL ANN RELKA: REAPING THE BENEFITS OF A GREAT EDUCATION



Michael has worked as an agriculturist at Western Sugar's Scottsbluff office since fall 2009 where she helps farmers produce a quality sugar beet crop.

he Western Nebraska Community College Alumni Association creates connections not only with alumni and friends, but also with current students. One successful connection is through a Service Learning Tax Project, a partnership with the WNCC Business Program, and a local non-profit, Community Action Partnership of Western Nebraska (CAPWN).

The Alumni Association is a designated IRS (VITA) Volunteer Income Tax Assistance site and helps Accounting II and Economics students complete a special IRS certification. Once students receive certification, they're able to assist with filing free federal and state returns, and as a result, they

volunteer eight hours at the CAPWN tax clinic assisting low-to-moderate income families complete their filings and receive their tax returns.

"This program was really driven by community need," shares Alumni Director Jennifer Sibal. "A local organization had been assisting with filing for many years and decided not to continue. It created a huge gap, so this partnership allows us to creatively add capacity while giving our students a great, hands-on learning experience."

Thanks to this incredibly successful partnership, 615 returns brought over \$750,000 in refunds to the community in the 2015 tax season.

GET YOUR FAFSA IN GEAR!

How to apply for financial aid for the 2017-2018 academic year.

t pays to find out about student financial aid. A number of resources are available to help you with the cost of college during the 2017-2018 academic year, but you must apply to be eligible. Here are some steps to take to make it easy:

- 1. Apply for admission to WNCC at wncc.edu/ admissions/apply. You'll be asked to supply high school and other college transcripts, ACT or SAT scores, or official GED scores.
- 2. Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). This is the best place to determine eligibility for federal student aid programs like federal grants, fixed-rate lowinterest student loans, and work-study funds.
 - Apply online at fafsa.gov.
 - Enter WNCC's school code (002560) on the FAFSA.

- Students (and a parent or guardian of dependent students) need a username and password known as an FSA (Federal Student Aid) ID to electronically sign the FAFSA. Obtain the FAFSA ID at fsaid.ed.gov.
- The FAFSA provides online help to complete the form and tax information can be imported directly into the FAFSA form from the IRS using the IRS DRT (data retrieval tool). Applicants must supply 2015 tax information when completing the 2017-2018 FAFSA.
- Eligible students may receive as much as \$5,920 in Federal Pell Grant to help pay college costs in 2017-2018.
- WNCC uses FAFSA results to determine eligibility for the Nebraska state grant known as the Nebraska Opportunity Grant.
- **DEADLINE**: Submit the FAFSA before July 1, 2017 to ensure all requirements are met and

- eligibility is finalized prior to the start of fall 2017 classes.
- · Notifications of requests for additional information and award notifications are emailed to the WNCC-provisioned email provided to all WNCC students.
- 3. Want free help completing the FAFSA? Contact AIM Educational Opportunity Center at 308.635.6777 or EducationQuest Foundation at 402.479.6654 or 800.303.3745, Ext. 6654.
- 4. Apply for other WNCC scholarships before September 1, 2017 at wncc.edu/scholarships.
- 5. Additional financial aid resources: wncc.edu/ cost-aid/apply-aid/financial-aid-resources.

Two Named to WNCC's Athletics Hall of Fame Inaugural Class

Western Nebraska Community College celebrated the inaugural class of the WNCC Athletics of Fame by enshrining Bobby Jackson and Dick "Night Train" Lane. The creation of the WNCC Athletics Hall of Fame serves to honor Cougars Athletics programs and student-athletes that have helped the college win regional titles and national championships.

> **Bobby Jackson** played basketball for the Cougars from 1993-1995. After graduating, he went on to play at the University of Minnesota and was later selected by the Seattle SuperSonics in the first round of the 1997 NBA draft. Jackson enjoyed 12 seasons in the NBA, playing the majority with the Sacramento

Kings, where he was a crowd favorite and known as "Action Jackson."

NFL Hall of Famer Dick "Night Train" Lane played offense and defense for the then Scottsbluff Junior College football team during the 1947-1948 season. Coach Bill Putnam called the Austin, Texas, native "a coach's dream." In 1952, the 24-year-old Army veteran asked for a tryout with the Los Angeles Rams. He made the team, and set a NFL singleseason record for interceptions with 14, a number that still stands today. Lane spent the majority of his 14 years in the NFL with the Detroit Lions. He passed away in January 2002 at the age of 73.


Groves steps up to the plate to coach softball team



I think anyone that has played for the program, hosted or taught a Cougar softball player, or attended a game can attest to how special it is. I'm excited to get going."

estern Nebraska Community College continues to expand its seamless transfer opportunities for students. Our faculty and staff have recently met with representatives from the University of Nebraska-Kearney (UNK) to address challenges our students face when transferring. UNK is committed to removing all barriers to transfer in hopes of recruiting more WNCC students.

Chadron State College is also committed to enhancing transferability. Last fall, 60 faculty and staff from WNCC and Chadron State met on our campus to share information and collaborate on transferability. Next fall, our faculty and staff is traveling to Chadron to continue the tradition of collaboration. Both institutions are working hard to ensure students can transfer easily and don't have to repeat coursework.

The University of Nebraska-Lincoln (UNL), College of Business, recently identified WNCC as the state community college they would like to partner with to develop a 2 + 2 transfer agreement. This partnership would ensure that students who graduate with an Associate of Arts degree in business would enter with junior status at UNL. No courses would need to be repeated, and students could go right into their specific business major.

Lastly, representatives from the University of Wyoming (UW) visited our campus last fall to discuss ways to enhance transferability. This can be an attractive option for students, as UW tuition is affordable and the university is just two hours from the Nebraska Panhandle.


