- Led efforts with academic teams in 4DX that resulted in a 10% increase in the graduation rate at the college, which placed the college firmly ahead of the state average for the Kentucky Community & Technical College System.

- Produced more shows per year than any community college and most 4 year universities in the southeastern U.S. The series produced one straight play, three full length Broadway musicals, one children's show, and a summer dinner theater fundraiser each year.

- Served as the face of the series and one of the primary faces of the college. Made dozens of media appearances and gave multiple interviews to both print and electronic media.
