PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

You may remember this brief dialogue from Lewis Carroll's *Alice in Wonderland*. It finds Alice at a fork in the road speaking to the Cheshire Cat:

"Would you tell me, please, which way I ought to go from here?"

"That depends a good deal on where you want to go to."

Our direction is divided into six specific areas of focus, each of which contains multiple programs and specific goals:

1. STUDENT RECRUITMENT

WNCC is committed to recruiting and retaining students from across the panhandle and surrounding areas. We'll expand our recruitment presence and work closely with our high school partners to reinforce the value that a community college represents and to assist adult students in pursuing a college education.

2. STUDENT SUCCESS

WNCC is committed to the success of each student. We will continue to review, modify, and implement solutions to ensure our students receive great academic advising, financial assistance, and success coaching to meet their goals.

3. STUDENT LEARNING

We envision the creation of a long-term effort that engages both students and faculty in advancing WNCC as a vital learning enterprise. WNCC will continue to invest in teaching and learning, focusing our energies on methods and approaches to assure subject matter mastery.

4. HIGH SCHOOL PARTNERSHIPS

Partnerships with local school districts are critical to ensure high school graduates are career and/or college ready. Career academies are essential to the economic well-being of our communities and the career aspirations of many of our high school students. Enhanced transfer and career/technical programs will provide students with specific courses aligned with their goals.

5. WORKFORCE READINESS

During recent Community Summits, the critical shortage of a highly skilled workforce was voiced. We will expand and support programs that offer local businesses opportunities to advance current employee skill sets, attract and retain new employees, and generate interest among high school students to consider rewarding careers with local industry partners.

6. RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT

We will increase our fundraising activities with alumni, regional businesses, and foundations in support of realizing the College's educational mission and strategic plan.

I look forward to reporting our progress along these six interconnected paths in this publication and in other forums. I also look forward to engaging more alumni in the life of the College—through gift support and by providing internships for our students, supporting students through attendance at their events, and helping us celebrate the important changes that are happening in higher education across the nation — especially right here at WNCC.

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
**The anatomy of a
great healthcare career
starts at WNCC.**



Western Nebraska Community College is proud to offer two new emphasis areas within the Science Department: *Chiropractic Medicine (Pre)* and *Surgical Technology*. Both are rigorous programs that include all of the required coursework in the sciences.

Starting in fall 2015, the **Chiropractic Medicine (Pre)** emphasis is designed and modeled after several successful programs across North America. Its recommended plan of study represents 60 of the minimum 90 prerequisite hours to be eligible for application to an accredited chiropractic school.

Of the 61 hours earned toward the Associate of Science degree, 48 include required coursework as established by the Council on Chiropractic Education (CCE) and are accepted by member institutions of the Association of Chiropractic Colleges (AAC).

Daryl D. Wills, D.C., who underwrites a chiropractic scholarship at WNCC, says the Chiropractic Medicine (Pre) degree provides students with a

local opportunity to pursue a career in chiropractic medicine that will serve the needs of area residents.

Tracy O'Neal, D.C., an anatomy and physiology instructor and local chiropractor, will serve as the program advisor.

WNCC created the **Surgical Technology** program at the request of local hospitals because of the need for qualified operating room technologists. Current statistics show a huge demand for qualified technologists and the field is expected to grow faster than average.

Surgical Technologists help save lives while learning the latest state-of-the-art techniques and using the newest equipment. The program is ideal for those looking to get into the healthcare field in a relatively short amount of time, as well as for new graduates or career changers.

It's important to note that Surgical Technology is an alternative to, but as academically rigorous as, nursing. A high degree of professionalism and academic prerequisites are required to gain entry into the program.

The Surgical Technology program is set to launch August 17, 2015 under the guidance of Program Director Paul Craig, CST.

Teachers and faculty are in critical shortage across the educational system from Pre-K through college. Regardless of temporary economic conditions, hiring practices, budget cuts, or any other factors that impact the education system, the need for teachers is timeless and universal.

Studies show that children who have the advantage of educational opportunities do well later in life. Because teachers impact students' lives in dramatic and compelling ways, teaching is one career in which students can be confident they'll always have a purpose.

Western Nebraska Community College affords multiple degree opportunities to fulfill this calling. Our transfer programs provide depth across a number of traditional academic majors, providing a smooth bridge to bachelor degree options. We also help students test the waters through field experience, partnerships, and service learning.

WNCC students often transfer to Chadron State College and the University of Nebraska-Kearney to complete their bachelor's degree. They work closely with WNCC's faculty advisors in developing the most efficient academic pathway specific to early childhood, elementary, or secondary education.

Students interested in teaching at a community college are encouraged to work closely with their faculty advisors. Community college teachers don't need a teaching license, but it's critical to have a master's degree with a minimum of 18 graduate hours in the subject matter to be taught.

There's never been a better time to get into the profession. According to the Occupational Outlook Handbook, 2010-2011, employment of teachers is expected to grow by 13 percent between 2008 and 2018.

If you'd like to positively impact a child's life—and society as a whole—consider entering the in-demand teaching profession. It's difficult but fulfilling work that offers great rewards.

Erica Muhr's desire to help others has been a constant throughout her life. She worked as a nurse's aid while taking practical nursing classes at the WNCC Alliance Campus.



KEVIN DAHLSTEDT HELPS CREATE A HEALTHY PROGNOSIS FOR FUTURE LPNS.

Kevin Dahlstedt’s parents told her she was going to start her college education at the WNCC Alliance Campus because it was only three blocks from home. Little did she know just how far she would go.

Dahlstedt transferred her general education credits to Chadron State College where she received a Bachelor of Arts in Business Administration, and eventually, a Bachelor of Science in Nursing from UNMC’s campus in Scottsbluff. She also earned her Master’s in Administration from UNMC Online.

Dahlstedt says she always loved academia and wanted to teach other nurses. In 2012, she joined the nursing faculty at WNCC. “I worked in long-term care for five years and realized the great need for LPNs in our workforce. The growing availability of online learning at WNCC helps provide these in-demand classes.”

As an instructor, she says she enjoys a large degree of independence and professional latitude, and enjoys helping others master the multiple education components required by nursing. “It’s rewarding to give back to the profession.”

JOHN BAHR: BECOMING A BIG WHEEL BY OVERCOMING PHYSICAL CHALLENGES.

Being a quadriplegic and an older student, John Bahr wasn't sure what it would be like to go back to school. But his friend Brooke Henzi, another wheelchair user who graduated from WNCC in 2012, provided the encouragement he needed to give it try.

Bahr, a Sidney native, found that WNCC's faculty and maintenance staff made sure things were adapted to assist him in the classroom and on campus.

"Being a wheelchair user, everyone was very accommodating. They made sure I had the tools

I needed to succeed, and ultimately, get my degree," Bahr says. He graduated in 2014 with his Associate of Arts in Journalism.

An exemplary student at WNCC, Bahr was a member of Phi Theta Kappa, the All-State Academic Team, Outstanding Language and Arts Student of the Year, and received the Board of Governors Award.

Bahr is currently taking a creative writing class through Chadron State College Online and just published his first book, *Journey into Paralysis*, available on Amazon.

Ethan grew up on a farm in Dalton, Nebraska and was homeschooled by his mother. He started taking dual-credit courses (high school courses that earn college credit) at the WNCC Sidney and Scottsbluff Campuses when he was 15 and became a full-time student at age 17.

Now in his senior year, Nelson has amassed an impressive 64 college credits and will graduate with an Associate of Science in General Studies this May. He recently became a recipient of the Questbridge

Scholarship, making it possible for him to attend the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia, where he plans to major in cognitive science. He also received the prestigious 2015 Coca-Cola New Century Scholar award—a top honor considering only one community college student from each state is chosen to receive it.

Hacking hard drives with spyware. Compromising cellphone SIM cards. Grabbing credit card information. Today, data breach reports abound, and the volume of identity theft cases continues to grow with no end in sight.

Enter Cybersecurity. An in-demand field on the front line of preventing and remediating attacks on personal data, using technical and non-technical skills and procedures to stop hackers in their tracks. WNCC offers information technology classes that

include security components—from Networking Essentials to Windows Server 2012. Next year, the college is adding a Cybersecurity Essentials class to better focus on this growing area.

Information technology students can start at WNCC in small classes that offer individualized attention and instructors who have practical experience in the industry—and then continue on to Bellevue University to earn their Bachelor of Science degree in Cybersecurity. Bellevue offers the entire degree track online to meet the needs of this growing

industry. Currently, three WNCC alumni are there working on Cybersecurity degrees.

To make sure it's the latter and not the former, WNCC's Student Success Team, made up of faculty, staff, and administrators, has created a new model of advising to support students and help them succeed in their educational goals.

"Our new Student Success Model is a program that begins prior to a new student enrolling, and supports them through various student lifecycle stages all the way through graduation," says Sue Yowell, J.D., Vice President of Student Services.

Stage 1: Expressing Interest in WNCC (Prospective Student to Applicant)


An admissions counselor assists prospective students in learning about WNCC and its programs, and helps them apply to the college.

Stage 2: Accepted Student—Getting to Know You Better!

Admissions counselors gather additional information about students in order to assign Student Success Coaches.

Stage 3: Successful Enrollment—Success Team Starts

New students meet assigned Student Success Coaches, discuss and create an initial career and educational plan, and register for first-term courses.



Stage 4: First Term at WNCC—Expanding Your Success Team

Student Success Coaches introduce new students to their faculty advisors. The faculty advisor assists students in moving forward with their career and educational plans.



Stage 5: Support Through Completion of Your Goals

Students continue partnerships with both the faculty advisor and success coach through the completion of their program of study and graduation.



Stage 6: Continuing Affiliation with WNCC

Students are encouraged to share successes with WNCC as they further their education, or enter the workforce. WNCC also encourages participation in lifelong learning opportunities and alumni activities at the school.

LADY COUGARS CAPTURE THIRD STRAIGHT REGION IX CHAMPIONSHIP

On Saturday, March 7, the Western Nebraska Community College Lady Cougars celebrated with all the hoopla you'd expect of their third straight Region IX championship win. It was a good night for WNCC's women's basketball team to lead a stellar defensive effort against Northeastern Junior College at Cougar Palace in the championship game of the Region IX Tourney. Fifteen teams participated in the tournament with close to 2,000 fans in Scottsbluff for the games. WNCC received the honor of hosting this year's tournament because the Lady Cougars finished first in the south region. The Region IX tournament switches each year between the north and south with the #1 seed hosting the regional championship.

The Lady Cougars earned a hard-fought 61-50 win, with Angela Vigil and Lile Havili each scoring

16 points. Yeliz Dogan was another double pointer, chipping in 10. Abi Lujan and Kalli Feddersen followed with six points each. Lujan, who was named to the all-tournament team and to the Region IX all-defense team, said this win was special, because it was on home court.

"Our goal was to win the region," the sophomore forward said. "We just ended up doing it and it's so exciting, so emotional that we've done it three years in a row. It's even better winning it at home because last year we won it at Western Wyoming and that was just tough with the whole crowd against us and we just had three fans there. Here, we had our home fans and it was just natural."

The championship puts the Cougars into a special category. They're the only Region IX team to 3-peat since 2000.



Several players wrapped up their careers at Cougar Palace with an emotional win. Lujan said when the clock was ticking down, the tears of joy started to come. "For us sophomores, it's our last game at Cougar Palace so it's really emotional."



- 2** Apply for Financial Assistance to Pay for College wncc.edu/scholarships
 - Complete the FAFSA – Free Application for Federal Student Aid – www.FAFSA.gov WNCC Code: 002560
 - Comply with requests for any additional forms or documents as required
 - Complete Housing Application online if applicable, wncc.edu/student-life/residence-life (Housing is available on the Scottsbluff and Sidney Campuses)
 - Pay housing deposit of \$180 (\$150 refundable upon leaving housing)
- 3** Meet with Your Student Success Coach
