
Important Information for Transfer Students:

- A maximum of 66 credit hours may be transferred from 2-year junior or community colleges with a grade of "C" or above.
- A minimum of 120 credit hours must be earned, of which 40 hours must be 300 or 400 level courses. Such courses must be taken at a four-year college or university. Any courses from a community college that are equated to UNK 300-400 courses do NOT count toward the 40 hour upper level requirement for graduation at UNK. A minimum of 32 semester hours applicable to the selected degree program must be earned through UNK.
- Advising is mandatory for all students before they can register.
- This form does not replace your Degree Audit.
- Students must receive a "B" or better in SOWK 170.
- Students apply for Admission to Social Work after completing SOWK 170 and SOWK 172, which students should take their first year at UNK, or if transferring both courses, students should apply as soon as possible. The application can be found on our website at www.unk.edu/academics/social-work
- UNK GPA must be established before full admission will be granted.
- Students must maintain a UNK GPA of 2.5 or above.




The intent of this agreement is to encourage transfer opportunities for students and enhance communication between the institutions.


